The Wooden Bowl

A frail old man went to live with his son and daughter-in-law, and four-year old grandson. The old man’s hand trembled, his eyesight was blurred, and his steps faltered.

The family eat meals together at the table. But the grandfather’s shaky hands and failing eyesight made eating difficult. Peas rolled off his spoon onto the floor. When he grasped the glass, milk spilled onto the table cloth.

The son and daughter-in-law became irritated with the mess. “We must do something about Grandfather,” said the son. “I’ve had enough of his spilled milk, noisy eating and food on the floor.”

So the husband and wife set a small table in the corner. There, Grandfather ate alone while the rest of the family enjoyed there dinners together. Since Grandfather had broken a dish or two, he ate from a wooden bowl.

When the family glanced in Grandfather’s direction, sometimes he had a tear in his eye as he sat alone. Still the only words the couple had for him were sharp admonition when he dropped his fork or spilled his food.

The four-year old grandson watched it all in silence. One evening before supper, his father noticed he was playing on the floor with some wood pieces. He asked the child sweetly, “What are you making?”. Just as sweetly the boy responded, “Oh, I’m making a little bowl for you and Momma to eat your food in when you get old.” The four-year old smiled and went back to work.

The words so struck the parents that they were speechless. Tears started to stream down their cheeks. Though no words were spoken, both knew what must be done. That evening the husband took Grandfather’s hand and gently led him back to the family table. For the remainder of his days, he ate every meal with the family. And for some reason, neither husband nor wife seemed to care any longer when a fork was dropped, milk spilled, or the tablecloth soiled.

Children are remarkably perceptive. Their eyes ever observe, their ears ever listen, and their minds ever process the messages they absorb. If they see us patiently provide a happy home atmosphere for family members, they will imitate the attitude for the rest of their lives. The wise parent realizes that every day building blocks are being laid for the child’s future.
